Chairman: DR. EDMUND J. JAMES, President Northwestern University.


Address: "The Social Aspect of the Morris Movement," by WALLACE RICE, editor and critic.

A preliminary organization of a Morris circle was effected at Toledo, Ohio, after a meeting at the Toledo Museum of Art, which was addressed by Mr. Triggs. Temporary officers were elected: Mr. George Stevens, president, and Miss Mary Ruth Locke, secretary.

Through the agency of Mrs. Joseph Twyman, a circle for the study of Morris was formed in November at Billings, Montana.

Mrs. David Kirk, president of the Twentieth Century Club of Pittsburg, is prominent in the Morris movement in Pittsburg. In reviewing "The Woman Who Toils," Mrs. Kirk answered the question of the book: "Who will act as mediator between the wage earners and the public" by saying "the arts and crafts J societies."

Mr. Triggs is announced for an address at Nashville, Tennessee, during his visit to that city late in December.

Mr. Joseph Twyman will speak on December 14th on "The Art and Influence of William Morris," with stereopticon illustrations, before the Chicago Architectural Club.

Professor Moulton announces a course in the literature of Morris for the Spring Quarter at the University of Chicago.

On his return to the city the last of November Mr. Martin Schütze took up actively the work of the Education Committee of which he is chairman.

The Publication Committee will announce in a few weeks the publications contemplated by the Society.
